Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.8 (2019-08-23)

- Functionality Added or Changed
- Bugs Fixed

Functionality Added or Changed

- MySQL Notifier now supports the following connection features:
 - Strong password authentication to MySQL 8.0 servers with the default caching_sha2_password authentication plugin enabled.
 - SSH connections that can be created directly in MySQL Notifier or MySQL Workbench.
 - Connections made using SSH tunneling and an existing SSH server. These connections are created transparently without also requiring intermediate software to create the tunnel.

Bugs Fixed

- A monitored MySQL instance or Windows service opened the MySQL Workbench home tab rather than the Administration tab when the instance or service was selected for management. (Bug #29891284)
- The operation associated with clicking **Add** in the Manage Monitored Items window opened a secondary context menu. This fix modifies the operation to perform a single action related directly to the current tab, without showing a secondary menu. (Bug #29868378)
- The Check for Updates action did not perform the expected operation, but started MySQL Installer instead. The action now checks for updated software as intended. In addition, the related Automatically check for MySQL updates option replaces the previous period between update checks (in weeks) with days. The existing value set for the option is converted from weeks to days automatically with the installation of this release. The Automatic check for MySQL updates option requires MySQL Installer 1.4.31 or higher (see Upgrading MySQL Installer). (Bug #29868329)
- The general option to Run at Windows Startup, after the check box was selected, did not remain selected between sessions or add startup entries when the entry list was saved. In addition, the Cancel button in the Options dialog box did not discard the changes made since the dialog box was last opened. (Bug #29740645, Bug #95250)
- MySQL Router was not monitored even if the router was configured to run as a Windows service. (Bug #28277456)
- Previously, services and instances could not be monitored when the remote connection was created using MySQL Workbench with SSH tunneling. Now, monitoring is enabled for SSH connections made directly from MySQL Notifier or MySQL Workbench. (Bug #26446338, Bug #87079)
- An exception was generated when attempting to start MySQL Installer from MySQL Notifier and then selecting No in the dialog box to the question about permitting changes. Now, selecting No performs no action as expected. All other startup errors are displayed at runtime and logged. (Bug #26301469, Bug #86738)

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.7 (2016-08-01)

Functionality Added or Changed

- The automatic migration of connections from MySQL Notifier to MySQL Workbench can now be delayed for a period of time or suspended indefinitely.
- An option for setting the interval to ping monitored MySQL server instances for status changes was added to the **Actions**, **Options** menu.

Bugs Fixed

- The Configure Instance option was renamed to Manage Instance. (Bug #24339668)
- An error was displayed when valid domain user credentials were used to add a remote Windows service. (Bug #24305736)
- Testing new connections for remote MySQL instances would display a "High Severity Error" message. (Bug #24010582)
- When MySQL Notifier was installed using MySQL Installer, an exception was thrown and MySQL Notifier failed to start. (Bug #23762891)
- The **SQL Editor** link to MySQL Workbench was disabled for each monitored MySQL instance or service when MySQL Workbench was installed. (Bug #23748734, Bug #82130)
- Validation checking identified *domain\username* as an invalid format to use when adding a remote Windows service to be monitored. Now, domain users with sufficient permissions to access the remote computer can connect using the *domain\username* format. (Bug #23746334, Bug #82120)
- The main XML element in %APPDATA%\Oracle\MySQL Notifier\settings.config was renamed to MySQLNotifier from MySQLForExcel. Indentations were added to improve the overall readability of configuration settings. (Bug #23740262, Bug #82104)
- Windows services on a remote computer were not retrieved and could not be added to the list services to be monitored. (Bug #23667056, Bug #82000)
- A corrupted connections.xml file caused MySQL Notifier to display a "Root element is missing" error message when started. (Bug #22160640, Bug #73540)
- Attempts to subscribe to a remote Windows service for the first time failed and returned a "High Severity Error" message when the remote service was an instance of MySQL. (Bug #20389122, Bug #75319)
- Case-sensitive naming prevented status changes to MySQL instances running as services for Windows. Now, service names for MySQL instances are added with compatible casing. (Bug #19881188, Bug #74516)
- A "High Severity Error" raised by MySQL Notifier appeared intermittently during installations performed using MySQL Installer. (Bug #17825477)

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.6 (2014-09-22)

Bugs Fixed

• A "High Severity Error" was thrown when restarting Notifier if MySQL services/products had been removed while Notifier was not running. (Bug #19439604, Bug #73576)

- A "High Severity Error" was thrown when a my.ini file for a monitored MySQL instance was deleted. (Bug #19422802, Bug #73539)
- Available updates detected by MySQL Installer were not being communicated back to MySQL Notifier. Now, the Notifier correctly displays notifications for available updates. (Bug #19219905)
- MySQL Notifier failed to start when a monitored service name contained the string "MySQL" since it
 was being treated as a MySQL server service. Now, the detection of MySQL services has been fixed to
 select real MySQL server services. (Bug #19078684, Bug #73135)
- Removing MySQL Workbench's connections from within Workbench, or by deleting the MySQL Workbench connections.xml file, now removes those MySQL connections from the SQL editor sub menus of corresponding monitored services in MySQL Notifier. (Bug #18163378)
- Selecting Actions, Check for updates, and then No, would throw a "High Severity Error". (Bug #17858917)
- MySQL Notifier now handles fabric, fabric managed, and unknown connections, in the instances dialog. Fabric connections are not shown, "Fabric Managed" connections are shown in the **Manage Instances** dialog with "Type = Fabric Managed". MySQL Connections that do not use a native, SSH, socket, or fabric driver are treated as unknown and not shown.

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.5 (2013-12-18)

This section documents all changes and bug fixes applied to MySQL Notifier since the release of 1.1.4.

- Bugs Fixed

Functionality Added or Changed

- MySQL connections can now be edited from within MySQL Notifier, and no longer requires MySQL Workbench to be installed.
- The MySQL Utilities can now be opened from MySQL Notifier.
- Notifier now automatically detects when Workbench is installed or uninstalled, and starts or stops monitoring its files, depending, which no longer requires MySQL Notifier to be restarted.

Bugs Fixed

- After executing Action, Manage Monitored items, Instance, and then Add MySQL Instance, clicking Cancel would generate an unexpected fatal error. (Bug #17697914)
- MySQL Instances linked to workbench connections were not removed automatically when MySQL Workbench was uninstalled. (Bug #17671410)
- A "High Severity Error" would be generated at startup if MySQL Installer attempted to install the MySQL Server and MySQL Notifier, and failed to install the MySQL Server. (Bug #17432516, Bug #70282)
- On Windows XP, if the current user lacked credentials to schedule tasks, the MySQL Notifier startup task was not scheduled after it was installed. (Bug #14388579)
- The SQL editor submenu did not automatically refresh when connections were added or removed outside of MySQL Notifier while it was running.
- Reinstalling MySQL Workbench would cause duplicate connection entries to be listed in MySQL Notifier.

• Installing a MySQL Notifier package when a previous version of MySQL Notifier was installed could corrupt the configuration file.

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.4 (2013-07-09)

The first public release of the new 1.1 branch that offers remote monitoring.

- Bugs Fixed

Functionality Added or Changed

• A **Refresh Status** action was added to the **Actions** menu. It manually refreshes the status of all monitored services (in both local and remote computers) and MySQL instances.

Bugs Fixed

• MySQL Notifier would crash if a dead (bogus) MySQL Server service was registered, and discovered.

A workaround was to remove the dead service, such as "sc delete MySQL_BROKEN", and then restart MySQL Notifier. (Bug #16980502, Bug #14349610)

- The MySQL Notifier service will now start itself immediately after being installed by the MySQL Installer. (Bug #16927045)
- On Microsoft Windows 8, the autostart registry entry was not created properly, therefore the Notifier would not start after the user logged in. (Bug #16832752, Bug #69279)
- MySQL Notifier would continue to run after it was uninstalled.

A workaround was to close MySQL Notifier before uninstalling it. (Bug #16661468)

- Services that were manually added to MySQL Notifier would not be listed until after MySQL Notifier was restarted.
- MySQL Notifier would not start after upgrading version 1.0.3 to 1.1.3.

A workaround was to delete the old 1.0.3 settings from the APPDATA folder before executing the upgrade.

• Instance options edited from the **Manage Instance Settings** dialog were not saved. They are now written to settings.config.

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.3 (Not released, Internal)

The third internal release of the 1.1 branch.

Bugs Fixed

• The MySQL Notifier status tray icon was improved, in that the status colors (green, yellow, and red) are more noticeable. (Bug #14332309)

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.2 (Not released, Internal)

The second internal release of the 1.1 branch.

Bugs Fixed

- Sometimes the MySQL Notifier failed to automatically add MySQL services to the monitor even when the AutoAddServicesToMonitor option was enabled. (Bug #16660623, Bug #15887501, Bug #14345177, Bug #67617)
- The MySQL Workbench SQL Editor link was visible even when the option was not available, and it
 would open the Home screen of MySQL Workbench. This link is now enabled if the available MySQL
 Workbench supports opening the SQL Editor from the command line, and if the bound service contains
 MySQL Workbench connections, otherwise the link is disabled. (Bug #14332402)

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.1 (Not released, Internal)

The second internal release of the 1.1 branch.

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.1.0 (Not released, Internal)

The initial release of the 1.1 branch, an internal release.

This branch introduces monitoring services for remote Windows machines through Windows Management Instrumentation (WMI), and monitoring of MySQL Instances (multi-platform) via a configurable timer.

Functionality Added or Changed

- Added the ability to monitor MySQL Instances (multi-platform) via a configurable timer.
- Added monitoring services for remote Windows machines through Windows Management Instrumentation (WMI).

Changes in MySQL Notifier 1.0.3 (2012-07-25)

Initial public release of the MySQL Notifier.

Bugs Fixed

- Changing the **Use Colorful Icons** option would not go into effect after option dialog window closed. (Bug #14357610)
- On Microsoft Windows XP, installing the MySQL Notifier would not schedule the startup task. (Bug #14357592)
- The MySQL Notifier failed to load if MySQL Workbench had not already been loaded at least once. This was due to how MySQL Workbench created a required directory. (Bug #14356442)
- MySQL Notifier would not uninstall previous versions during installation. (Bug #14352140)
- Filtering errors would result in full stack traces. Stack traces are not longer reported to the user. (Bug #14347636)
- The error message windows were title as "MySQL Notifer" instead of "MySQL Notifier". (Bug #14347590)
- A log file was added, and unhandled exceptions are now logged. The log file is located here: %APPDATA \Oracle\MySQL Notifier\MySQLNotifer.log (Bug #14343520)
- The MySQL Notifier status could be incorrect if the MySQL Server was stopped and started without the Notifier. (Bug #14332357)

- The **Configure Instance** option would open the **Server Status** section of MySQL Workbench but now loads the Administration window. Also, **SQL Editor** now opens the MySQL Workbench SQL editor. (Bug #14332346)
- On Microsoft Windows XP, the **Notification when service changes state** option now works properly. (Bug #14332341)
